Amy Gillett pathway celebrates a historic turn today

The new extension of the Amy Gillett pathway is branching away from main roads to follow the historic railway line through fields and vineyards between Mt Torrens and Birdwood. The first 400 metres have been completed and this initial stretch will be marked with a sod turning ceremony at the work site in Mt Torrens today.

The new section will follow the old train track route between the original Mt Torrens Railway station and the Birdwood Railway station, both now demolished. However, original features remain along the route and have been revitalised by Council, including 100 year old stone drains and hand poured concrete pipework.

The project will extend stage four of the Amy Gillett Pathway from its old end point in Mount Torrens at Oval Road, taking it through to the intersection with Onkaparinga Valley Road in Birdwood, adding 5.7 kilometres to the overall length of the bikeway

Federal and State Government funding of \$2.6 million each and a Council contribution of \$500,000 have made the extension possible.


Amy Gillett Pathway, Oval Road Mt Torrens – along the new pathway extension just past the Mt Torrens Oval (see attached map over).

Amy Gillett pathway, 430 metres from the car park and accessible by normal car, unless it is raining in which case there is only 4WD access. There is limited space to park cars along the bikeway at the
